WHO?

All SRPSD prekindergarten and kindergarten students, caregivers and teachers are involved in this oral language assessment. Additional assessors may be trained to deliver the assessment. WHAT?

The *Help Me Tell My Story* (HMTMS) assessment uses a holistic approach to assessment that measures oral language development in 3-5 year olds. In order to provide a holistic view of each child's learning, the assessment collects data from the children, their caregivers, their teachers and Elders in their community. The data is uploaded from the iPad to the HMTMS web portal for immediate access by teachers and caregivers.

WHEN?

Pre-assessment (Sept)	Incorporate learning materials in your classroom: Askî puppet, storybooks and scrapbook to

create context prior to the assessment.

Assessment window Child surveys are administered by Askî and adult surveys are completed by teachers, caregivers,

and elders. Survey results are uploaded to the HMTMS site and data is available within a week

for teachers and caregivers.

Post-assessment Distribute passwords to caregivers and support them in logging in to the Caregiver Portal to

access their child's results and learning ideas.

Use data to create shared oral language goal(s) and collaborative action plans for home and

school to support oral language development in daily experiences.

WHERE?

HMTMS supports a holistic, strengths-based, community approach to learning. Teachers are encouraged to provide ongoing caregiver engagement before, during, and after the assessment window. Engagement events in the home, school and community are opportunities to communicate the importance of supporting oral language development with daily activities, discuss individual student goals, as well as share strategies/learning ideas between the home and school.

WHY?

Oral language is the ability to speak and listen. Children with less developed oral language skills, struggle with sharing their thoughts, acquiring new understandings, and developing reading and writing skills. With the home and school working together to increase oral language, our children will be better able to comprehend and respond in all situations.
