Boys without names Sheth, Kathmira Grade 10

Summary: For eleven-year-old Gopal and his family, life in their rural Indian village is over: We stay, we starve, his baba has warned. With the darkness of night as cover, they flee to the big city of Mumbai in hopes of finding work and a brighter future. Gopal is eager to help support his struggling family until school starts, so when a stranger approaches him with the promise of a factory job, he jumps at the offer.

But Gopal has been deceived. There is no factory, just a small, stuffy sweatshop where he and five other boys are forced to make beaded frames for no money and little food. The boys are forbidden to talk or even to call one another by their real names. In this atmosphere of distrust and isolation, locked in a rundown building in an unknown part of the city, Gopal despairs of ever seeing his family again.

But late one night, when Gopal decides to share kahanis, or stories, he realizes that storytelling might be the boys' key to holding on to their sense of self and their hope for any kind of future. If he can make them feel more like brothers than enemies, their lives will be more bearable in the shop—and they might even find a way to escape.

Catching Fire Collins, Suzanne Grade 10 c2009

Summary: By winning the annual Hunger Games, District 12 tributes Katniss Everdeen and Peeta Mellark have secured a life of safety and plenty for themselves and their families, but because they won by defying the rules, they unwittingly become the faces of another impending round of "Hunger Games".

Chrysalids, The Wyndham, John c1955

Summary: John Wyndham takes the reader into the anguished heart of a community where the chances of breeding true are less than 50 per cent and where deviations are rooted out and destroyed as offences and abominations. The narrator is David, who can communicate with a small group of other young people by means of 'thought shapes'. This deviation from a cruelly rigid norm goes unnoticed at first. But sooner or later the secret is bound to be discovered and the results are violent, horrific and believable. **CURRICULUM RECOMMENDED: Suggested Use: ELA 10- Mysteries of Life (A10) (69 copies/support material)**

Ender's game Orson Scott Card Grade 10 c2002

Summary: Once again, Earth is under attack. An alien species is poised for a final assault. The survival of humanity depends on a military genius who can defeat the aliens. But who? Ender Wiggin. Brilliant. Ruthless. Cunning. A tactical and strategic master. And a child. Recruited for military training by the world government, Ender's childhood ends the moment he enters his new home: Battle School. Among the elite recruits Ender proves himself to be a genius among geniuses. In simulated war games he excels. But is the pressure and loneliness taking its toll on Ender? Simulations are one thing. How will Ender perform in real combat conditions? After all, Battle School is just a game. Right? **(40 copies + Audio CD) Suggested Use: English Language Arts; The Mysteries of Life (A-10).**

For the children Rita Joe Gr. 6-10 c2008

Summary: Down-to-earth and often humorous, these poems tell stories of Mi'kmaw life, and of the concrete and spiritual world of the determined and courageous Rita Joe. World honored Mi'kmaw elder, Order of Canada recipient, Rita Joe passes the torch to the young.

Hunger games, The Collins, Suzanne Grade 10 c2008

Summary: In the ruins of a place once known as North America lies the nation of Panem, a shining Capitol surrounded by twelve outlying districts. The Capitol is harsh and cruel and keeps the districts in line by forcing them all to send one boy and one girl between the ages of twelve and eighteen to participate in the annual Hunger Games, a fight to the death on live TV. Sixteen-year-old Katniss Everdeen regards it as a death sentence when she steps forward to take her sister's place in the games. But Katniss has been close to dead before - and survival, for her, is second nature. Without really meaning to, she becomes a contender. But if she is to win, she will have to start making choices that weigh survival against humanity and life against love.

Innocence lost: a play about Steven Truscott Cooper, Beverly Grade 10 c2009

Summary: In June of 1959, 12-year old Lynne Harper was found raped and strangled in a farm woodlot near Clinton, Ontario. A few months later her classmate, 14-year old Steven Truscott, was convicted of the murder. he was sentenced to death by hanging. In this incisive and emotionally-taut dramatization of the case, Beverley Cooper recreates the world of Steven Truscott and his friends. Cooper leads the audience through the case afresh and sheds light on the human cost of what is now considered to be Canada's most notorious wrongful conviction. **(40 copies) CURRICULUM RECOMMENDED:**

Killing Mr. Griffin Duncan, Lois c1978

Summary: A teenager casually suggests playing a cruel trick on the English teacher, but did he intend it to end with murder? **(56 copies/support material)**

Life of Helen Betty Osborne: Robertson, David Alexander HS c2008 a graphic novel

Summary: Helen Betty Osborne dreamed of becoming a teacher. Sadly, her dream never came true. Helen left her home in Norway House, Manitoba, to attend Guy Hill Residential School in 1969. In September 1971, she entered Margaret Barbour Collegiate in The Pas, Manitoba. Two months later, on November 13, 1971, she was brutally murdered by four young, white men. Years later, the Aboriginal Justice Inquiry concluded that her murder was the result of racism, sexism, and indifference. **(15 copies)**

Macbeth Shakespeare, William

Summary: On the level of human evil, Shakespeare's Scottish tragedy is about Macbeth's bloody rise to power, including the murder of the Scottish king, Duncan, and the guilt-ridden pathology of evil deeds generating still more evil deeds. As an integral part of this thematic web is the play's most memorable character, Lady Macbeth. Like her husband, Lady Macbeth's ambition for power leads her into an unnatural, phantasmagoric realm of witchcraft, insomnia and madness. But while Macbeth responds to the prophecies of the play's famous trio of witches, Lady Macbeth goes even further by figuratively transforming herself into an unnatural, desexualized evil spirit. The current trend of critical opinion is toward an upward reevaluation of Lady Macbeth, who is said to be rehumanized by her insanity and her suicide. Much of this reappraisal of Lady Macbeth has taken place in discussions of her ironically strong marriage to Macbeth, a union that rests on loving bonds but undergoes disintegration as the tragedy unfolds. Miracle worker, The Gibson, William

Summary: A dramatization about seven-year-old Helen Keller, showing how the blind, deaf, and mute girl was taught by her perseverant nurse, Anne Sullivan, to communicate with the world by the sense of touch. It describes the difficulties which the nurse overcame in her attempt to reorient Helen's family to the task of disciplining and understanding their handicapped child. **CURRICULUM RECOMMENDED: Suggested Use: ELA 10- Mysteries of Life (B10) (32 copies/support material)**

Of mice and men Steinbeck, John

c1965

Summary: They are an unlikely pair: George is "small and quick and dark of face"; Lennie, a man of tremendous size, has the mind of a young child. Yet they have formed a "family", clinging together in the face of loneliness and alienation. **CURRICULUM RECOMMENDED: Suggested Use: ELA 10- Equity and Ethics (B10) (77 copies/support material)**

Summary: Seguel to: Shakespeare bats cleanup

Fourteen-year-old Kevin Boland, poet and first baseman, is torn between his cute girlfriend Mira and Amy, who is funny, plays Chopin on the piano, and is also a poet.

Swallows of Kabul, The Khadra, Yasmina Grade 10 & 12 c2002

Summary: Set in Kabul under the rule of the Taliban, this extraordinary novel takes readers into the lives of two couples: Mohsen, who comes from a family of wealthy shopkeepers whom the Taliban has destroyed; Zunaira, his wife, exceedingly beautiful, who was once a brilliant teacher and is now no longer allowed to leave her home without an escort or covering her face. Intersecting their world is Atiq, a prison keeper, a man who has sincerely adopted the Taliban ideology and struggles to keep his faith, and his wife, Musarrat, who once rescued Atiq and is now dying of sickness and despair. All four individuals struggle to hold onto their humanity during a time where pleasure is a sin and death is routine.

Why shoot the teacher Braithewaite, Max

Summary: The author uses Geronimo's life as a metaphor for the many abandoned native people on this continent, trapped in the slow-moving vehicle of another culture which is taking

Bootlegger blues: a play Drew Hayden Taylor c1991

Summary: Set on a reserve, it follows the plight of Martha, a church-going, teetotaling woman who finds herself stuck with 143 cases of beer after a church fundraiser fails. She decides to bootleg the beer, to the horror of her son Andrew, nicknamed Blue, who is a special constable on the reserve. Meanwhile, Andrew has fallen for a young woman he thinks is his cousin, and his sister Marianne is bored with her "Indian Yuppie" husband and finds herself attracted to a handsome dancer at the powwow. The pace is fast and vigorous in this romantic situation comedy.

Child of Dandelions

Shenaaz Nanji

Summary: Sabine is 15 years old and lives a comfortable life with her Indian parents in Uganda. In 1972, General Idi Amin declares that Indians must be weeded out of the country in 90 days. At first, Sabine cannot believe that Indians born in Uganda will be forced to leave their home. As the countdown continues, she sees the poverty and hostility around her. Sabine realizes that she has lived a life of privilege. Even her best friend, Zena, ignores Sabine. Soldiers raid the family home, and Sabine's parents are forced to flee. Sabine is left to take care of her brother and find a way to escape Uganda. **CURRICULUM RECOMMENDED: Suggested Use: English Language Arts 10- The Challenges of Life (A10); Equity and Ethics (B10)**

Summary: Twin brothers Seth and Eli Maddox are Keylanders brought up within the privileged and protected Eastern Key. Keylanders, the boys are told, must keep within their walls to avoid the filth and disease spread by the Droughtlanders—those who struggle to survive on the parched land between the Keys. But when Eli sees their mother helping one of the wretched Droughtlanders, a chain of terrible events begins to unravel the life they've all known and will pit brother against brother in a life-or-death struggle between two worlds.
