TRC

DRA

In an effort to improve the collection, analysis, and use of the division DRA data, some changes have been made to the DRA database. In the past, teachers were able to choose if they entered their DRA results as Test I or Test 2. This caused some confusion in the collection of year-end data as some spring data was entered as Test I and others as Test 2. To remedy this, test dates have now been locked and will be recorded as follows:

Test I – any data entered between August to November 30

Test 2 – any data entered between December 1 to March 30

Test 3 – any data entered between April I to June 30

A deeper understanding of the Treaty Essential Learnings will allow teachers to strengthen their practice and support other teachers in their school. The <u>Eat Well and Be Active Educational Toolkit</u> (Health Canada) is designed to help those who teach about healthy eating and physical activity, and encourage individuals to take action to maintain and improve their health. <u>Mindcheck.ca</u> was developed to help teens identify and understand mental distress they may be experiencing and direct them to sources of help that enable them to learn skills and strategies to help manage these problems. Topics include: anxiety, depression, stress, substance abuse, and psychosis.

Science

The role of questions:

It is essential to develop questions that are evoked by student interests and have potential for rich and deep learning. These questions are used to initiate and guide the inquiry and give students direction for investigating topics, problems, ideas, challenges, or issues under study.

Students should recognize that science is often unable to answer "why" questions; in these instances, scientists rephrase their inquiries into "how" questions/(Saskatchewan Curriculum, 2009).

Math

Please continue to send in any feedback regarding the common assessments. Necessary changes will be made later this month. The French translations of the common assessments are well under way and will be done by early January.

The database is also up and running properly. As you enter data make sure you choose the appropriate test to enter your data. If you happen to reassess outcomes throughout the year you can go in and override any data you originally entered.

With the holiday season in full swing, facts related to career education and Christmas are just a Google search away. Did you know...?

- If all the Hallmark Christmas cards sold in Canada were lined up end to end, they would stretch back and forth from Toronto to the North Pole six times.
- There are about 15,000 Christmas tree growers in North America, and over 100,000 people are employed full- or part-time in the industry. Canada is home to about 2900 Christmas tree farms.
- During the Christmas season, Visa cards are used an average of 5,340 times every minute in the United States.
- The Bank of Montreal's 2012 Holiday Spending Outlook has found that respondents plan to spend an average of \$1,610 this Christmas, up from \$1,397 in 2011. Shoppers surveyed say they plan to spend an average of \$674 for gifts this year, compared to an average of \$583 last year.
- During the holiday period, Canada Post expects to deliver up to one billion cards, letters and parcels in Canada. This will result in the hiring of close to 1,000 seasonal workers who will join the 69,000 people already employed at Canada Post. Even Mrs. Claus will be joining Santa this year to help him respond to over I million letters sent to him at Canada Post!
- In order for Santa to deliver all of his presents on Christmas Eve he would need to travel at 650 miles per second and visit 822 homes per second. He must be very efficient with his customer service!
