2. Educational Plans

Home-Based Educators' Education Plans must include:

- 1. The reason for and philosophical approach to home schooling
- 2. A minimum of 3 annual goals in <u>each</u> area of study: Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies.
- The individual goals must be specific. You may wish to refer to the Provincial Curriculum Guides for examples of subject specific goals: http://www.education.gov.sk.ca/curriculum.
- 3. The means of assessing and recording the educational progress of each broad annual goal—to be included in the Annual Progress Report.
- The *Annual Progress Report* must include either:
 - a: a portfolio of work, or
 - b: test results* demonstrating the progress of the student.
 - *The Ministry Policy requires the tests to be *nationally normed standardized achievement tests*. An example of acceptable assessment evidence is the Canadian Achievement Tests (CAT).

3. Ministry of Education Policy and Education Plan Instructions

Ministry of Education Policy

The intent of the educational plan is for the parents to demonstrate that they have a positive and constructive approach to the education of their children before commencing their home-based education program.

Each educational plan shall be:

- Consistent with the official Goals of Education for Saskatchewan; and,
- Appropriate for the age and ability of the students on the program.

Since home-based is, by its very nature, less structured and more experiential than instruction normally provided in a school or registered independent school, the educational plan is not required to contain a scope and sequence of content to be taught throughout the school year.

Parents shall not be required to include in their educational plan any concept, topic, or practice in conflict with their conscientious beliefs, or to exclude from their written educational plan any concept, topic or practice consistent with their conscientious beliefs.

Parents may make curricular and instructional adjustments to their home-based education program during a school year in accordance with the educational needs and progress of each student on the program, as long as these adjustments are consistent with their educational plan.

Parents may make amendments to their educational plan during a school year, as long as the amendments are acceptable to the registering authority.

Ministry of Education Instructions

The educational plan outlines the home-based education program.

As long as the educational plan contains the four elements listed above (goals for language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies), parents have the freedom to structure their plan in accordance with the philosophical approach of their program.

While some elements such as the philosophical approach will be common to the entire program, other elements such as the learning objectives should be specific to each student on the program.

Areas of study refer to the subject areas including language arts, mathematics, science and social studies.

Where applicable, the educational plan should include reference to the major supplier, if any, of learning resource materials for the home-based education program, such as a correspondence school or an extension school.

The educational plan may be self-generated, with or without the help of a home-based education support group, or commercially generated by a supplier of home-based education curricula.

The educational plan should contain adequate information for the registering authority to have a fair opportunity to determine whether the plan is not inconsistent with the *Goals of Education for Saskatchewan* and not inappropriate for the age and ability of each student on the program.

3. Evidence of Student Growth

I am encouraging families to submit portfolios for their year-end report. The portfolios should be minimal (two brief samples of student work in each of the four core subject areas). Families choosing to provide test results should be aware that the Ministry Policy requires assessments to be *nationally normed standardized achievement tests* such as Canadian Achievement Tests (CAT).

5. The Goals of Education (Saskatchewan Ministry of Education)

The Goals of Education recognize the inherent worth and value of each individual. Education, then, should develop the potential of each person to the fullest extent. It should also enhance the ability of each individual to cope effectively in a changing physical, economic, and social environment.

Basic Skills

- Read, write and compute;
- Acquire information and meaning through observing, listening, reading and experiencing;
- Process information through intellectual and technological means;
- Solve problems by applying basic principles and processes of the sciences, arts and humanities; and,
- Communicate ideas through written and spoken language, mathematical symbols and aesthetic expression.

Life-Long Learning

- Seek and value learning experiences;
- Act as self-reliant learners; and,
- Base actions on the knowledge that it is necessary to learn throughout life.

Understanding and Relating to Others

- Act on the belief that each individual is worthwhile;
- Base actions on the recognition that people differ in their values, behaviors and lifestyles;
- Interact and feel comfortable with others who are different in race, religion, status or personal attributes; and,
- Develop a sense of responsibility toward others.

Career and Consumer Decisions

- Develop an awareness of career opportunities;
- Develop interests and abilities in relation to vocational expectations;
- Adapt to shifts in employment patterns and technology; and,
- Make informed consumer decisions.

Growing with Change

- Work toward immediate and long-term goals;
- Base actions on an understanding that change is a natural process in society;
- Select workable alternatives in response to changing conditions; and,
- Develop confidence in making decisions that involve risk.

Membership in Society

- Assume responsibility for their own actions;
- Work with others to achieve individual and group goals;
- Participate in the democratic processes of government and perform the duties of citizenship;
- Respect the rights and property of others;
- Act with honesty, integrity, compassion and fairness;
- Develop a sense of national pride and acknowledge the need for international understanding;
- Work toward greater social justice;
- Assume responsibility for dependent persons in a manner consistent with their needs;
- Respect law and authority; and,
- Exercise the right of dissent responsibly.

Self-Concept Development

- Perceive themselves in a positive way;
- Appreciate their own abilities and limitations;
- Set and work toward personal goals;
- Assess praise and criticism realistically; and,
- Present themselves with confidence

Positive Lifestyle

- Practice appropriate personal hygiene, engage in sufficient physical activity, and maintain a nutritionally balanced diet;
- Avoid harmful use of alcohol and other drugs;
- Cultivate interests that may be the basis for personal development and leisure pursuits;
- Recognize the importance of productive activity;
- Display initiative and pursue tasks diligently;
- Maintain a safe and healthful community;
- Respect and seek to enhance the environment;
- Appreciate beauty in its many natural and constructed forms; and,
- Express themselves creatively.

Spiritual Development

- Seek an understanding of the purpose and worth of human existence;
- Develop a knowledge of God; and,
- Respect family, religion and culture in a pluralistic society.

6. Carlton Extension Campus (Grades 10 to 12)

Students wanting to obtain high school credits through a home-based education program can enroll directly through Carlton Comprehensive High School's Extension Campus Program.

Home-based students interested in courses offered at the Carlton Extension Campus (CEC) should contact Carlton Comprehensive High School at 922-3115 (extension 215). You will be asked to visit the school and spend some time with a counselor from Student Services who can assist you to plan your distance education program. There is no cost to register in a CEC course.
