Student Civic and Social Responsibility

Locally:

anwood Community Public School students really are making a difference in our community and globally.

In 2001, Canwood Community Public School began a partnership with our local Whispering Pine Place Nursing Home in support of a *Youth Volunteer Program*. Students ages 13 and up are scheduled to visit the nursing home on a weekly basis. Here they read to the residents, go on walks together, play games, make puzzles, spend time visiting or help to make crafts in preparation for special occasions. There are a total of 17 students signed up for the volunteer for the 2013-2014 school year.

Our partnership extends further than the volunteer program. For the past 13 years our school and the nursing home



have been partnering to host the Terry Fox Run and raise money (over \$35,000.) for cancer research. The program has seen changes over the years but the purpose and the joint effort still remains the same. Some participants, students and community members, walk, jog or run to our local Regional Park and back while others meet the residents at the nursing home and help maneuver the wheel chairs on their journey of hope. By participating in the run together we remember and support those people living in our community with cancer and those who have lost their battle. The program helps to build school spirit and community and it is a positive step towards finding the cure that we need!

The month of May is the SRC students turn to organize and run the monthly "Birthday Party" at the nursing home. They make birthday cakes, purchase gifts, and entertain the residents with their singing, dancing and musical talents for the afternoon.

It is not only our high school students that have a special connection with the nursing home but our elementary students as well. Several times a year the Kindergarten – Grade 5 students and their teachers, visit the nursing home to sing Halloween songs, regale them with Christmas choruses, make Valentine's Day cards and color Easter eggs.

All of these interactions are extremely rewarding and beneficial for both the students and the residents.

Globally:

Just this last year, in the fall of 2013 a group of students decided to form a team called Youth Taking Action. Spear headed by one of our Grade 11 students, Joelle Hoeflicher, this group has joined forces with Free the Children to "Adopt a Village "in Totoras, Chimborazo Ecuador. This area is home to the largest number of indigenous communities who suffer from some of the highest rates of poverty in the country. They have limited access to water, education, economic opportunities, health care and the resources needed to maintain a nutritious food supply. Our students and their fundraising efforts are helping to bring this under privileged community a clean and safe water supply. The money raised will help to build hand washing stations, clean water systems, and latrines. It will also be used to educate



the people about the importance of water sanitation. Water is vital for maintenance of proper family health and hygiene. To complete this project the students need to raise a total of \$5000. To date *Youth Taking Action* has raised \$3,000 through donations, a poinsetta sale and a mom's pantry fund raising. This project will not only change the lives of the people in Ecuador but the lives of those students

who have seen what their gift of giving can do.



The Power of WE at T.D. Michel

To say that We Day Saskatchewan was a great experience for my students is an understatement; life-changing would be more accurate. It is hard to explain how electrifying it is when close to 15 000 students from across the province come together for a common purpose; to make the world a better place. I knew that We Day would be a great experience for my grade six students. What I didn't know was how deeply they would be affected by what they had heard and seen that day.



When we arrived back in Big River, we quickly started planning our first action project. We Scare Hunger at T.D.M. came together quickly and easily. I was surprised at the initiative and enthusiasm that a group of 11 and 12 year olds displayed. When discussing the issue of hunger and the fact that there were people living right in our town that didn't know where their next meal was coming from, I could see the disappointment and empathy in their eyes. Our class set to work decorating donation boxes to set up in the elementary school, the high school, and they also set up a table to collect donations at the family Halloween dance in town. They even challenged our superintendent, Rob Clarke to fill a bucket of food and return it to our school - and he did! When all was said, done and weighed, we were able to donate 440 pounds of food to our local food bank. My students were impressed and I was extremely proud.

Choosing a global action project took a little more time to process. Not because we weren't ready to start, but because we wanted to do some research to choose the right issue to donate our time and efforts towards. In the end, we all agreed that clean water was where we wanted to focus our efforts. This project is a work in progress. So far we have raised just over \$300 to donate to *Free the Children and Ryan's Well*. Our goal is to raise even more before the end of the school year.

Our most recent project was inspired by the story of Malala Yousafzai and the following quote from the late Nelson Mandela, "education is the most powerful weapon we can use to change the world". In discussion with my students, I could see how frustrated and horrified they were by Malala's story. They clearly felt that all children should have the right to an education. That feeling turned into action. My grade six students volunteered five hours of their own time over two nights of parent teacher interviews to sell ABC Education Rafiki Chains. For each chain sold, *Free the Children* would provide one overseas student school supplies for a year. They sold enough chains to provide one hundred children school supplies and raised \$1000! The pride and excitement I saw in my students when they heard the total was one of the best feelings I've had in my teaching career.

Since We Day, my students have become active and engaged citizens. They are genuinely concerned about the well-being of others, quick to lend a helping hand, and have become exceptional role models for the younger students in our school. I consistently see empathy, compassion, and pride in my classroom and I could not be more proud of what my students have accomplished this year. When I say that We Day was a life-changing experience, I truly mean it.

To continue our service learning initiative we chose *Free The Children's* global cause called *WE CREATE CHANGE*. Wednesday March 12, 2014 for an
intimate ceremony to recognize the
Saskatchewan Forces members who
have lost their lives in Afghanistan.
The event coincided with the
official end of Canada's mission
in Afghanistan. Canadian soldiers

lowered the flag for the final time at NATO's Kabul headquarters. This is a significant day for our school and citizens – of the 45,000 Canadians that have taken part in the mission, 162 heroes have made the ultimate sacrifice, and 17 of those heroes were from Saskatchewan.

Carlton's ceremony was attended by a Saskatchewan veteran of

the war in Afghanistan, Master Corporal Gerald Minielly and several Cadets who are students at Carlton. It included a reading of all the Saskatchewan heroes who died in the war and was followed by the raising of the Canadian Flag accompanied by the singing of O' Canada by students Kassia Clarke and Shaelynn Cowles.

Canada had joined other member

NATO states in the War on Terror in Afghanistan following the Sept. 11 attacks in 2001. And for students at the Carlton, the war spans most of their lives. This was an opportunity for Carlton students to learn the impact of the contributions of all Canadians, whether they were in uniform or not, to the international effort in Afghanistan.

Carlton Continues Partnership with Habitat for Humanity

for our community in the fall of 2010.
Since then, approximately 50 Carlton
students have been responsible for
building four beautiful new homes in
Prince Albert over the last four years in
semester one. These 50 students have
been part of the Carlton Carpentry

Apprenticeship Program (CCAP).

The partnership between Carlton and *Habitat for Humanity* has proven to be a benefit to both organizations and to the community. *Habitat for Humanity* facilitates partnerships between prospective home owners, businesses, individual donors, and volunteers to build affordable housing in Prince Albert. Carlton students in grades 10 – 12 involved in CCAP can earn up to six credits toward graduation in semester

one and also accumulate carpentry apprenticeship hours. Students learn about and take part in every aspect of construction of a home from the ground up. Students work along with and learn from a Carlton teacher who is a journeyman carpenter.

P.A.C.I. Students Create Community Connections

ur PACI family is committed to developing social responsibility within our students. We have many different initiatives ongoing within our community and school.



Leadership is a characteristic that we value and nurture at PACI. There are many extracurricular options to developleadershipthrough experiences in sport and club atmospheres. Students at PACI also have opportunities to learn leadership skills through their curricular classes as well. One class in particular which focuses on this characteristic is the Leadership 30

class. Through classroom lessons students are exposed to different forms and examples of leadership. They explore their own leadership strengths and have the chance to develop their areas of growth. Students make

connections to the community through opportunities where they initiate and lead projects. This past year, the class was involved with volunteering at Jesse's Garden, the SPCA and King George School where students carried out a *Reading Buddies* program with

Grade One students. Students from this class continue to shine as leaders within our school with their involvement in SLC, PACI Changers and other groups at the school.

Working from a course developed by the Martin Aboriginal Entrepreneurship Program; the Aboriginal Youth Entrepreneurship Credit Course focuses on the skills needed to develop youth entrepreneurship ventures with a point of view guided by First Nations principles and beliefs. Students work on the development of a business plan throughout the semester utilizing mentorships with community business owners. These mentors are valuable resources to the students as they develop their plans and make them as realistic as possible. The end goal is for PACI students to be able to enact the plan towards their own business venture after the class is completed.

Another initiative at PACI is the dance program. Dance is a way to express one's self physically, emotionally, and mentally. It develops confidence, sparks creativity, and fosters relationships. The *PACI Dance Program* takes pride in being able to share these benefits of dance with people in the community by teaching classes, leading workshops, and giving performances. This year, the dance

program had a blast working with adults from Kin Enterprises, giving them weekly lessons during November and December. PACI dancers also spent a day helping younger kids build self-esteem and stand up to bullying by leading a workshop with Grade 4 - 6 students at Vincent Massey. Dance has changed the lives of many of the students at PACI and they plan to continue passing on their love of dance to other elementary schools and Kin Enterprises in the upcoming months. You can also find the dancers on stage at their May 28th, More Than A Room show at the E.A. Rawlinson.

PACI continues to foster connections within our community providing our students with countless opportunities to develop into well rounded young adults. We create unique learning experiences and develop literacy skills as we support students to become who they want to be!
