FIND TIME TO DO SOME SUMMER READING WITH YOUR CHILDREN

The long, lazy days of summer stretch out before us and soon our children will be wondering what to do to fill their days. Grab a book and read! For those students who enjoy reading, there will be nothing better than sitting on the beach with their nose buried in a book that carries them to some foreign land in a different time. Many students however see the summer as a time to remove themselves from anything even remotely related to school. Unfortunately reading skills can suffer over the summer.

Teachers have long recognized summer reading loss and now there is substantial research to verify teachers' September experiences. Students who do not read at all during the summer will experience a loss of reading skills that over time can accumulate to a two year reading gap by the time the

student reaches the middle years. The good news is that "reading even four to five books during the summer is potentially enough to prevent a decline in reading achievement" according to the president of the International Reading Association, Linda Gambrell.

So parents, join with your child in finding novel ways to get books into their hands during the summer break. Here are a few suggestions:

* Read a book with your child. Oprah's book club has created a renewed interest in talking about books. When you and your child read the same book, it provides plenty of opportunities for discussion during those long car rides, and it is much more stimulating than watching a DVD!

* Read in short spurts during the day and talk about what you have read. Just as dividing a 40 minute workout into smaller bits is effective so is reading for 5 minutes three to four times a day. Can you find an interesting headline in the local paper? What catches your eye in the magazine rack at the check-out? How goofy are some of those alien stories? Read one with your child and talk about what you have read and whether it sounds like the truth. Children need to understand that not everything they read in print is actually true.

* Watch a movie and then read the book and decide which you like better. Good readers make pictures in their heads as they read. Struggling readers may have trouble doing this but a movie can help to fill in some of the details for them. When you share your pictures with your child, you are helping to build their skills.

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Kristy Martin, a history teacher from Debden Community School will be attending the History Teachers Professional Development Tour in France this summer from July 27 to August 5, 2008. Kristy, selected from a number of teacher applicants from across Canada, will join 30 other teachers to take part in the 4th annual opportunity to discover Canadian World War I and II historic sites. During the week long tour, Kristy will travel to Northern France and Normandy to gain first hand knowledge of Canada's participation in WWI & WWII. She will visit Canadian battlefields at Vimy Ridge, Beaumont-Hamel, the Falaise Gap, Normandy, and the D-Day landing sites at Juno Beach. While in Normandy, the lucky group of teachers will tour the Juno Beach Centre to gain a complete overview of Canada's involvement in the Second World War. Kristy will also attend seminars and hear local speakers who will share their knowledge of the significance of Canada's landings

at Juno Beach, the Battle of Normandy, and Victory in Europe that followed. Kristy is looking forward to meeting many of the locals who lived through D-Day and the Battle of Normandy, enjoying the kind hospitality in Normandy, and sharing teaching ideas with other history teachers from across Canada.

We know that Kristy will return filled with fresh ideas and information to share with her fortunate students next year.



Bill Yeaman, vice-principal and teacher at Kinistino School will attend the Historica Canadian Battlefields Foundation High School History Teacher's Study Tour from July 9 - July 19, 2008. The purpose of the tour is to introduce teachers to some of the most important Canadian battlefields and memorials in Belgium and France. The study tour is designed to provide an in-depth understanding of the Canadian experience in the two World Wars. Prior to going to Europe, Bill will have some homework to do. He will be given the name of a soldier commemorated at a site in either Belgium or France, to research and is expected to present a brief biological sketch to other participants when they visit the relevant site. Daily readings and map assignments will allow him to take part in discussions that encourage consideration of a variety of concepts including

the moral dimensions of war as well as exploring ways of presenting information to students. Bill has taught history for a number of years and believes it is important to have students understand the implications of war. Each year he introduces veterans to his history students and has them work together to develop a Remembrance Day service that tells the stories of the remaining heroes. His experiences in Europe will no doubt be shared with the students of Kinistino for the benefit of all.
