INNOVATIVE TEACHERS REPRESENTING CANADA

In May 2008 **Jennifer Drysdale**, Grade one teacher at Kinistino School, and **Stacey Monette**, Integrated Learning Consultant for Saskatchewan Rivers School Division, joined together to apply to be one of Microsoft's Innovative Teachers of the Year. It has recently been announced that they will represent Canada, along with 3 other teachers from across the country, at the International Innovative Teachers conference in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Jennifer and Stacey began by focusing on the Grade one science unit, "animals", and created a cross-curricular project designed to deepen student understanding through the integration of technology. During instruction students were guided through many hands-on learning activities to help them construct understanding of the essential question "Are people and animals dependant on one another?"

While technology was used to enhance student learning and understanding of the key objectives, it did much more than that. A classroom SMARTBoard, document camera, student laptops, and a proscope exposed students to relevant information and experiences which extended far beyond their classroom walls. Students gathered information on pets from other Grade one classrooms in the Saskatchewan Rivers School Division, they conducted research by viewing webcams from zoos across Canada and the United States, and established pen pals with a classroom in New Zealand.

While making connections and communicating with a larger

audience was important, connecting and communicating with the students' families was also a large part of the project. Jennifer and Stacey created a website to bring parents into the classroom and allow them to participate in their child's learning. Parents were invited to participate in on-line surveys and work through website activities with their children. On the website they were able to view videos of classroom activities and a photo gallery of the whole learning experience. One of the favourite parent activities was exploring their child's online learning portfolio.

While Jennifer and Stacey have been chosen to represent Canada in Kuala Lumpur, it is easy to see that the big winners in this whole project were the students who participated!



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CARDBOARD BOAT CHALLENGE

On Wednesday, November 5th, Carlton Comprehensive High School along with Skills Canada and the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship & Trade Certification Commission proudly hosted a regional Cardboard Boat Challenge. Armed with cardboard, duct tape and a few other odds and ends, Grade 8 students from the Prince Albert area transformed these materials into a vessel that not only floated but carried passengers as well. Parents, teachers, and fellow students came to cheer on their favourite teams.

The skills necessary to succeed in the Cardboard Boat Challenge are identified as outcomes in the new Grade 8 Practical and Applied Arts course. The Challenge allows students to have a great time learning these new skills as well as strengthening their leadership, teamwork, and problem solving ability.

The Cardboard Boat Challenge is a team event, with each team being made up of 4 students from a school. This year 20 teams from

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
ON TRACK AT QUEEN MARY COMMUNITY SCHOOL

In August 2007, Queen Mary Community School staff went to their School Community Council with an idea that would continue to improve fitness options for the whole Queen Mary community; they came with the idea of a paved walking track for their playground. The School Community Council agreed to take on the project and one short year later (2008) students and community members are walking on the track on a daily basis.

The 270 metre track, which circles the open field on the east side of the school, is the latest in a list of fitness initiatives at Queen Mary. Over the past few years the school canteen has gotten much healthier, the extra-curricular sports program has flourished, an annual health fair has been established, and they have qualified for the "Quality Daily Physical Education" award.

While this latest fitness initiative has everyone at the school feeling good, they are quick to recognize that a project of this magnitude was not something they could accomplish on their own. A total of \$35,000 was raised through fundraising events sponsored by the School Community Council and through donations from the Prince Albert Optimist Club, Northern Lights Development Corporation, Prince Albert and Area Community Foundation, the City of Prince Albert Community Initiative Fund and the Kinsmen Club of Prince Albert.

While the students benefit from the track in the day, many of those who live in the neighborhood take advantage of the new fitness opportunity outside school hours. The whole community is really "on track" at Queen Mary.



BEFORE, DURING, AND AFTER: MAKING THE MOST OF PARENT TEACHER INTERVIEWS

November is here and so are parent teacher interviews. This short 10 to 15 minute interview is your opportunity to meet the school staff that will have so much impact on your child in the months ahead. Are you nervous, worried that you won't know what to do or say? If you are, you are not alone. Here are a few tips to help you make the most of your critical time.



BEFORE YOU ATTEND YOUR INTERVIEW:

- Read your child's report card.
- Make notes about your questions and concerns.
- Talk to your child about the report and inquire if he or she has any questions they want you to ask the teacher. Make a list.
- Think of things you want information about: homework, attitude, behaviour, strengths, weaknesses, grades.
- Think of things the teacher may need to know; you know your child better than anyone else.

DURING THE INTERVIEW:

- Start the interview on a positive note as both you and the teacher want what is best for your child.
- Create an action plan with the teacher for success for your child.
- Don't forget to use the list of questions and comments you brought with you.
- Listen carefully and make notes as the teacher talks about your child

AFTER THE INTERVIEW:

- Talk with your child about the conference.
- Stress the good things the teacher said and talk about what needs to be improved.
- Don't hesitate to contact the teacher again if you feel another meeting is necessary.
- Work together with the school administration to make school a positive and effective experience for your child.

REMEMBER:

Being involved in your child's school life will go a long way toward easing your stress. It will also pave the way for a successful year for your child. Lastly, if you are worrying about an upcoming interview... prepare ahead of time!

Red Wing School is in the middle of a three year Smart Goal involving the implementation of the new provincial Mathematics curriculum. Our goal for 2008-2009 is as follows: 95% of the students in Grade K. 1, 4 and 7 will be grade in the yellow, blue or green zone on the school division assessment rubric. In addition 80% of the students in Grade 2, 5 and 8 will grade in the blue or green zone on the school division assessment rubric.
