### Did You Know? (cont'd)

- One of sessions at the RIC/HSIF Fall Forum was What we have Learned about Keeping Kids Connected.
- It was reported that the number of children & youth who cannot be confirmed as enrolled in school is relatively small.
- Truancy and transiency are more frequently the issues. Attendance data & classroom participation provide critical information for prevention & intervention

- Attendance policies and practices can make a difference in student retention and reconnection.
- Integrated, community based approaches are most effective.
- Case-management practices are in place but not always formal.
- School outreach programs (home visits) have a positive impact on student attendance.

#### The Community Initiatives Fund

- Prince Albert RIC priority areas for the year are food security, housing and public safety. Applications that address these issues will be given priority.
- The Community Initiatives Fund (CIF) was introduced by the provincial government to ensure that Saskatchewan communities received benefits from Casino profits from the Regina & Moose Jaw casinos.
- To be eligible to apply for CIF a community organization must \*have a
  primary purpose & activities that are charitable in nature\* be incorporated in Saskatchewan as a non-profit corporation \*be a community
  based or voluntary Sask. group that is endorsed by a recognized partner organization such as a municipality, school, school division or
  health region.
- For annual grants, up to a maximum of \$25,000 per project is allowed. Grant deadlines are June1st, Nov. 1st & Feb. 1st. (subject to change)
- For summer programs up to a maximum of \$5,000 per project is allowed. Due to limited funding applicants may receive funding for not more than one annual grant and one summer grant in any given year.

#### **Student Employment Experiences**

- Student Employment Experiences (SEE) is a year round program designed to connect student to career-quality work relevant to their field of study.
- Community based organizations are eligible to receive 75% of student salary & benefit costs to a maximum of \$3,500 per full time student & \$2,000 per part-time student.
- The organization making the application must be an incorporated, nonprofit community or voluntary organization.
- Interested organizations can request application forms by contacting the Regional Intersectoral Committee office at 765-6620 or the SEE administrator in Regina at 780-9308.
- Deadline for SEE applications for summer programming is March 1st.
   October 1 is the deadline for submitting fall/winter applications.
