Mission

CMPA is an effective two-tiered, integrated multi-agency team, building safer and healthier communities, reducing crime and victimization; accomplished through the mobilization of resources to address individuals/families with acutely elevated levels of risk as recognized across a range of service providers, a broader focus on long-term community goals and initiatives, and possible systemic recommendations arrived at via experience, research and analysis.

CMPA Team

CMPA success is based largely on the totality of commitment and synergy of our partners. They include: Social Services Child Protection, Social Services Income Assistance, Mental Health, Addiction Services, Prince Albert Police Service, Catholic School Division, Sask. Rivers School Division, Prince Albert Grand Council, RCMP, City of Prince Albert, Mobile Crisis, Public Health, Adult Probation, Youth Probation, Corrections, Prince Albert Fire Department, Bylaw Services, Prince Albert Parkland Health Region and the Prince Albert Housing Team.

The HUB

The HUB is one of two key components within the Community Mobilization Prince Albert model.

It is the component that provides immediate, coordinated and integrated responses through mobilization of resources to address situations facing individuals and/or families with acutely elevated risk factors, as recognized across a range of service providers.

This is the arena where individuals representing the Ministries and Police members involved meet to discuss those cases in specific detail, within the limits of relevant information sharing rules and regulations, in order to determine solutions through coordinated efforts. Currently, HUB meets twice a week for two hours per session. Approximately 20 individuals participate in each meeting, representing the full cross section of the CMPA partners.

Case Management

A case can originate from any of the HUB stakeholders, through the active HUB members, or through another community organization.

A mobilization unit, the HUB does not have any actual case management role or authority, but rather focuses on working with already existing resources within the community and Province. Any case management is done by either the originating Ministry/Police agency or by the most appropriate agency as determined by the group.

The Center of Responsibility (COR)

The COR is the second of the two key components within the Community Mobilization model and it's function is quite different from that of the HUB.

The COR's focus is on the broader notion of community safety and wellness with an eye towards longer-term community goals and initiatives and possible systemic recommendations, formed through experience, research and analysis.

Made up of representatives from the participating Ministries and Policing partners, the COR works to:

- Gather research, both from the HUB and other resources.
- Provide liaising support amongst agencies.
- Provide incubation and mentorship of community solutions and innovations.
- Mobilize community amenity solutions.
- Provide reports regarding recurrent patterns and lessons learned, as well as promising practices and possible system gaps.
- Provide ongoing economic analysis in terms of Business and Social Return on Investment (BROI, SROI).
- Compile and create metrics to support a growing basket of measures, working with the Province to ensure consistency.
- Be a central source for research data, information, referrals, and consultation.
