## **School Division Answers**

### **SCC Questions**

During the May 10, 2010 meeting with the Board of Education, SCC members had a number of questions on many topics. This is the second installment of answers to these questions.

### How and When are Playgrounds **Inspected**?

The school division has a weekly playground

inspection process. Caretakers complete a written checklist which contains the following items:

 $\Box$  Check for and remove loose garbage, debris, broken glass, and animal droppings on play area ground surface.

□ Check play structure

for obvious signs of damage, vandalism, or broken parts. (Advise management immediately if service is needed.)

 $\Box$  Check for and remove skipping ropes or any other ropes or climbing devices which have been attached to but are not a permanent part of the



playground structure.

- Rake sand/gravel to replenish areas beneath swing bays, slide exits and fire poles.
- Empty garbage can(s) located in the playground area.

Caretaking staff are asked to record any action they have taken.

Staff from the school division maintenance department inspect playground equipment monthly. However, if equipment is in urgent need of repair, the school principal can submit a service request.

If members of the community notice an unsafe condition in a playground, they should contact the school principal.

### Do you have any ideas on encouraging community members to become involved with the SCC?

The Government of Ontario has provided the following Parent Involvement Checklist to help School Community Councils review current parent engagement activities and to stimulate discussion and ideas for future activities and events.

- Have we used surveys and other information-gathering tools to assess what parents need and want, and to ask for their opinions and suggestions?
- Have we determined the barriers which may prevent some parents from participating?
- Do we understand the needs of parents whose first language is other than

English?

- Have we explicitly invited parents to volunteer in a variety of school activities?
- Do we know how parents are getting our information, and how they would like to receive it?
- Do we routinely gather parent contact information and use it effectively to keep parents informed?
- Do we have an organized plan for parent engagement activities this year?
- Do we respond immediately when parents indicate a willingness to volunteer or participate in other ways?
- Do we have a school information package for newcomers?
- Do we have an organized method for meeting and welcoming new families?
- Do we actively encourage parents to attend School Council meetings?
- Do we acknowledge and involve parents who attend Council meetings for the first time?

specifically geared to the needs of newcomers?

- Have we successfully addressed barriers to parent participation such as childcare, transportation, language services and offsite / off-hours events and programs for those who cannot attend regular events?
- Do we regularly provide school events that showcase student work and activities, address issues of concern, and provide information of interest to parents?
- Do we involve the community in the life of the school through such events as career and community fairs?
- Do we offer training for volunteers to help ensure that they feel confident and equipped for their roles?
- Do we provide parents with the information they need to work effectively with school staff, and to support their children's education at home?
- Do we celebrate our multicultural community by offering events that feature

varied traditions, customs and sports?

- Do we prominently display information about School Council in a high visibility area of the school?
- Does School Council have a presence at school events?
- Do we have a School Council newsletter and/or is the School Council represented in the school newsletter?
- Does the School Council have a presence on the school website?
- Do we send frequent reminders to parents?
- Do we participate as guest speakers wherever possible in the community, outside of school?
- Do we recognize the efforts of parents and School Council members, to encourage greater involvement and participation?
