LEARNING EMPATHY IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Roots of Empathy is an evidence-based classroom program that has shown significant effect in reducing aggression among elementary school students while raising social/emotional competence and increasing empathy. Since its inception in 1996, Roots of Empathy has reached over 450,000 Kindergarten to Grade 8 students across Canada.

At the heart of the program are a neighborhood parent and baby (2 to 4 months at the start) who visit a classroom 9 times over the course of a school year. A trained instructor coaches the students to observe the baby's development and label the baby's feelings. In this experiential learning, the baby is the "teacher" and a catalyst that the instructor uses to help students identify and reflect on their feelings

and feelings of others – empathy. The instructor visits that classroom 27 times in the program.

Students at Queen Mary Community Public School & King George Community Public School have been experiencing child development and learning empathy this year as their schools pilot a new program.


Building A Better Community Through Drama

Members of **Carlton Comprehensive's** extra-curricular drama program, The Mad Hatter Theatre Company (MHTC), under the direction of drama teacher **David Zulkoskey**, are taking a proactive role in building better school communities within the SRPSD urban schools. In April, the students will be conducting a total of six anti-bullying workshops for students in grades 5-9. The Carlton students were involved in a Red Cross anti-bullying training session, *Beyond the Hurt*. The goal is to stop bullying behaviour, prevent it from occurring and to empower those who are victims to seek assistance and in turn enable the bullying individual to change their behaviour. The wonderful aspect of this program is that it is youth helping youth in a meaningful exchange of ideas and through positive role models.

The grade 9-12 students have been very active in developing community initiatives within Prince Albert. In 2011, they were approached by Community Mobilization PA to create a theatrical presentation on

In the words of grade 11 student Jordyn Ferguson, "We've all become really good friends and we've all realized that our hard work through something we think is so small can make a huge impact on other people . . . even though we're only in grades 9, 10, 11, or 12, we can still make a huge impact on our community."
